The Academy once again welcomes Dr. Michael Strauss to our lunch meeting. He will be with us on **January 17th** at 11 o'clock in the Heritage Room of the Webster Commons. Please note that this is the third Monday instead of our usual second Monday meeting.



Dr. Strauss is a David Ross Boyd Professor of Physics at the University of Oklahoma in Norman. He conducts research in experimental elementary particle physics currently at CERN in Geneva, Switzerland, where he studies the fundamental particles and forces in the universe. His most recent research has focused on measuring properties of the Higgs Boson and searching for other Higgs-like particles.

Dr. Strauss earned his B.S. in Physical Science from Biola University and his Ph.D. in elementary particle physics from The University of California, Los Angeles. He did post-doctoral research for the University of Massachusetts at the Stanford Linear Accelerator Center.

He has been a professor at the University of Oklahoma since 1995 and has also performed research at Fermilab near Chicago studying the properties of the quarks and gluons that make up the proton.

Dr. Strauss has received a number of teaching awards including the Associated Students' Outstanding Professor in the College of Arts and

Science and the Regents Award for Superior Teaching. He has spoken about the intersection of science and Christianity at universities, schools, and churches throughout the world.

He is the author of the book *The Creator* Revealed: A Physicist Examines the Big Bang and the Bible, and one of the general editors of Zondervan's Dictionary of Christianity and Science.

Kathleen Sodowsky was born to George W. and Lena (Cartwright) O'Hara in Sherman, Texas on January 17, 1919. Kathleen graduated from Sherman high school and then enrolled in Bethany Penial College in the fall of 1936. Just a few weeks later, she met Paul Milford Sodowsky, and they were



married September 2, 1938. They had two children: Linda and Paula.

Kathleen served with Paul for 20 years as pastor and wife in Nazarene churches in Texas, Kansas, and Missouri. She enjoyed working with children and making home and hospital calls as part of their ministry. Later, Paul would take a position at Nazarene Headquarters in Kansas City, Missouri, and Kathleen as a secretary in the Department of World Missions. She also worked as a secretary in the office of General Superintendents. She obtained her B.A. degree at Avila College in Kansas City. Her last 10 years in Kansas City were spent as private secretary to the Dean of Nazarene Theological Seminary.

Paul and Kathleen retired in the fall of 1982, moving to Oklahoma City. They traveled to Brazil, spending time with their daughter Linda and her family who were missionaries there. They enjoyed many travels both domestic and abroad, including Europe, China, and an Alaskan cruise.

Kathleen loved people and was very involved with many groups. She was a member of Bethany First Church of the Nazarene, the Academy of Senior Professionals, and the Association of Retired Ministers and Missionaries. She spent as much time as possible with her grandchildren, and later her great-grandchildren.

Kathleen was preceded in death by her parents, her husband, Paul Milford Sodowsky, her daughter, Linda Stamps-Dissmore, her sister, Polly and husband, her brother, George O'Hara; and brother-in-law, Cecil Sodowsky.

She is survived by her daughter, Paula Anderson and husband Don; seven grandchildren, and 20 great-grandchildren.

SNU Connections by Howard Culbertson

Our interviewee for the SNU Connections moments in the January luncheon will be Ashly Armstrong, the director of Southern Nazarene University's Student Health Center.



Ashly is herself a graduate of SNU, having graduated with a multidisciplinary degree in which her primary concentrations were business and nursing. She completed her course requirements at Oklahoma State University to be licensed as a Registered Nurse. After getting her R.N. license, she spent 13 years working as a nurse for Integris Health. During part of that time she also worked as a school nurse for Mustang Public Schools.

Last spring, Ashly came to SNU to be the director of the Student Health Center. That center has a walk-in clinic on the bottom floor of the Commons building (directly under the Heritage Room where we meet for our luncheon meetings). It also uses space on the main floor of the Commons for a COVID testing center.

The Student Health Center aims to provide primary care and health education to students (and even to faculty and staff). The Health Center functions as a division of Student Life. Directed by a registered nurse who reports directly to Executive Vice President Mike Redwine, the center has had a higher profile than normal during the COVID-19 pandemic period. The center gets especially busy when students return to campus after having been home for a break and must all submit to a COVID test to be able to remain on campus.

Then, on February 6, we jump into *Lilith*, a novel by author and theologian George MacDonald.


