As a senior corporate executive, Sanders headed a multi-million dollar design firm, was executive vice president of a Washington D.C. based growth firm, served as vice president of a national financial insti-

tution and in a nonpartisan role with the United States Senate as its Sergeant of Arms.



Echoes from our January Meeting



Dr. Thurman Eugene Coburn

Thurman E. Coburn, the seventh of eight children born of Lud Eugene and Mattie Owens Coburn, was born August 10, 1919, and died on December 28, 2016. He grew up on a farm in Sabine Parish, Louisiana, during the depression years.



Following high school, Thurman enlisted in the U.S. Navy where he served for nine years. He earned the rank of Chief Petty Officer, the highest rank attainable by a non-commissioned officer. He served in both the Atlantic and Pacific theaters during WWII, mostly aboard destroyers, the USS Borie and the USS Goff. He was awarded a Presidential Unit Citation for helping eliminate the threat of German submarines in shipping supply routes to Africa and Europe.

After his discharge from the Navy, he moved to Bethany with his wife Dorothy and infant son Gene. He earned his undergraduate degree from Bethany Nazarene College (now SNU). After completing a Ph.D. in psychology at the University of Oklahoma, he practiced in Oklahoma City until the age of 83. Additionally, he taught psychology at SNU and initiated a counseling program for his church.

Dr. Coburn was a member of Bethany First Church of the Nazarene and served on the church board for many years. He attended the "Kumjoinus" Sunday School class.

He was preceded in death by his parents, five brothers, one sister, his first wife Dorothy Knippers Coburn and their son Gene, and his second wife Annette Dipboye-Coburn. He is survived by his sister, Wilma Whaley of Louisville, Kentucky, step-daughters Debby Dipboye Griffin and husband Jerry of Bethany and Jan Dipboye Collum and husband Mark of Oklahoma City, three step-grandchildren, three step-great-grandchildren, and many nieces and nephews.

The funeral service for Dr. Coburn was on January 3, 2017, at Bethany First Church of the Nazarene.


